# Last Meeting

Last month the meeting was at Tom and Stacy Nehl's shop and Tom demonstrated making a three legged bowl. The bowl started out like a regular bowl mounted on a worm screw in his chuck working the area that was to become the bottom first. A circle was inscribed on the blank to indicate the diameter of the bottom of the bowl, another to indicate the opening at the top and a final one near the edge to indicate the width of the rim which will become the feet. Wood was removed between the circle for the rim and the one for the bottom in an inverted "V" shape toward the top. A tenon was put on the cone shape so that when reversed to hollow out the center of the bowl it could be used to hold the piece in the chuck. Care must be taken not to remove too much wood toward the top so as to cut the rim free of the center. When reversed, Tom hollowed out the center in a cone shape. The feet are created on the bandsaw by dividing the rim into thirds and then determining the width of the feet and making marks on the rim for the be-



end of the cut for each leg. Tom made а sliding jig to aid in this operation. Some sanding on the leg edges finished the job.

Three years ago, The CWT entered into and purchased our own individual liability insurance policy. The AAW has since re-offered a liability policy, available to all chapters. The CWT Board has decided to continue with our own individual policy through February 2016.

The CWT is a great organization and I summarized the liability insurance need to highlight a basic expense, one of the many expenses, we have as a club. Your Annual dues, raffle proceeds and promotional events proceeds, IE: Woodfest, McGowan House Artisans Christmas Ornaments, all help funds the CWT, so we can keep our bills paid.
