Last Meeting

You come into possession of a large beautiful piece of wood that just screams to be made into a platter about 24 inches across but your lathe will only handle 20 inches. What to do, give up and cut it down to fit your lathe? NO, give outboard turning a try. Jeremy Hansen faced this dilemma several years ago and gave Harold Rosauer a call to ask what to do. Harold said outboard turning would solve the problem. They worked out a solution and this is what it looks like.





Several things were brought out during the demonstration. The blank was mounted on a faceplate with a lot of screws. It was noted that several had broken off so a good idea would be to pre drill the holes for the screws. Whatever you do **don't** use drywall screws to mount anything to the lathe. They are brittle and break very easily. The headstock of the

lathe could be turned around or slid to the opposite end of the lathe to give the proper space to accommodate the blank. Another possibility would be to make risers for the head and tail stock and the tool rest would have to be raised appropriately in this scenario. The speed which the blank can be turned will be very slow relative to a normal turning and will be helped greatly with a balanced blank. If the turning is to be natural edged vibration will be a constant problem and the largest bowl gouge you can get will help. The tool rest will have to be sturdy, very sturdy, and be able to stand the bump sand bangs the tool will deliver to it during the initial roughing of the blank. Harold indicated that a scraper works well and perhaps better than a gouge for this type of work. Dry hard wood is difficult to work and a wet blank would be preferable. The photos show the bottom of the blank being worked on and a tenon turned to mount it to a chuck. The chuck in question is the Vicmark 150 with the largest jaws available. One very important consideration is what direction do I turn the piece. The piece should turn in the direction that causes the faceplate or chuck to be such that it is always being tightened to the drive. If not when a large piece is stopped the centrifugal force of the spinning would could cause the faceplate to unscrew itself and the blank could injure you or have an edge damaged or broken.

Give this technique a try you may find you like it.

The Help Corner with John Sandor



Hello! I'm Mike Elliott, head of OWL (Ottumwa Woodworkers League) in Ottumwa, IA. I came across your site while searching for CR woodworking (I lived in CR for 40 years till retirement - I worked with one of your members, Mike Goerdt).

The reason I'm writing is to pass along a warning to your club in case you have some people who are not aware of this pallet hazard. A lot of people recycle pallet wood for use in woodworking and in certain cases this can be deadly. See the attached link.

Pallet wood warning

A warning in case you ever use pallet wood. I had an offer of some nice looking free wood from pallets that had come from another country (China to be exact, but the stamp may indicate India). And having been involved with packaging for many years before retiring, I knew to look for a symbol that's on pallets that tells where they came from and what they have been treated with (pallets are treated to kill bugs from traveling).

These particular pallets had MB in the stamp on them (bottom right of stamp in picture - hard to read).

This stands for Methyl Bromide and is a deadly pesticide. DO NOT HANDLE, CUT OR BURN ANY PALLET WOOD THAT HAS MB STAMPED ON IT. Only a few countries still use this, (China and India I think), all other countries



have banned using it. Although there are a few other treatments, most pallets everywhere are now treated with high heat and the stamp will have HT on it for Heat Treated.
