For those who didn't make the hands turning session last month and have the opportunity to get some hands on experience with a skew chisel, Harvey Jeck, who has been using a skew for many years, will give us a demonstration and some tips on how to use this pesky tool. Many beginning turners who try the skew and have bad experiences give up and never learn how versatile this tool is.

# **Last Meeting**

During the May CWT Meeting, Kevin Bierman took the time to discuss his techniques to turn a ball in a box. Kevin's interest in this turning challenge came from a recent article published in the American Woodturner Magazine authored by James L. Pruett.

Kevin explained how he made special wood jaws to hold the "square wood block or wood cube". These special jaws were mounted to his Cole or Jumbo Jaw on his scroll chuck. It was impressed in order to make sure your turning was as centered as possible, it is important to mark a reference point on the chuck jaws. When the "Cube" is inserted into the jaws, this reference mark should be transferred to each of the six sides of the "Cube". This will allow you to remove and reinsert the "cube" into the chuck and minimize any eccentricity.

Kevin also shows the special riser jib to hold the cube while turning the "Ball" as well as the special drive center and tail center to hold the ball.

All in all, Kevin kept the members in awe with his turning expertise. By breaking down the process into individual steps, Kevin made what looks to be a difficult turning a very understandable and easy process which any turner could master.

### **Empty Bowls**

More thanks to all who donated bowls to the empty bowls project. Jim Irvine reported that of the 61 bowls donated, 47 sold for a total of \$1020 to help support food banks in the area. The remainder will be held for next years event.
